Regina Public Schools are moving to a more inclusive environment and therefore will have fewer congregated programs. There has also been a hold put on testing students in elementary schools. I strongly disagree with the board's decision to make these changes.

The benefits of having a learning disabilities program like this one is that there is more one-on-one teaching for Grades 9 and 10. In these two grades, the LD program offers math and English with

eight to 10 students in a class.

Other classes such as phys.ed., social and sciences are taken in a regular class. In these classes, you don't get the one-on-one help you need, so sometimes you sit there and do nothing because there isn't enough time to have with your teacher when there are that many students in there.

In Grades 11 and 12 you have all regular classes with one tutorial. They are just trying to get you ready for any post-secondary classes or college, if you plan to go. There is also morning, lunch and after school help you can get with the LD staff when needed. The teachers help you study and give you study techniques and strategies that will help you so you can eventually do it on your own.

You can also write exams in the LD classrooms so the teachers can read the exams, scribe or advocate for more writing time. All of these things help you get the marks that you deserve as a student.

If I hadn't been tested and diagnosed with a disability, I would have been a

Before I was tested they found out that my reading was at a pre-k, kindergarten level and my writing was at the same level and not legible for others to read.

Now with the support I have received in my lifetime I can read at a Grade 5 to 7 level and write legibly so others can read it. I can also get my thoughts on paper better than I ever could have done. I will be able to make a living on my own when I am ready.
